New streamlined support service improves care for victims of domestic abuse

A new model of support has been unveiled to transform the safety and wellbeing of victims of domestic abuse across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.

The new service, jointly developed by Police and Crime Commissioner Darryl Preston and partners, is available for all adult victims of domestic abuse assessed as medium risk who report their experiences to police. Launched on 1 April 2025, it sees specialist staff from domestic abuse charity Peterborough Women's Aid embedded within the PCC's existing Victim and Witness Hub to support all adult victims of police-reported domestic abuse crimes who have given consent for help and are deemed at medium risk of harm.

Victims of domestic abuse referred to the service are offered short-term, phone-based emotional and practical support alongside safety planning. Those requiring longer-term support are referred on to local specialist domestic abuse support agencies depending on their needs including the current Domestic Abuse Support Services (DASS) Outreach Service and The Meadows Children and Family Wing.

Already, early benefits of the new service have been identified, with the co-location of specialist staff allowing professional conversations to take place with Hub Coordinators and investigating officers to protect victims from the trauma of having to relive their experiences over the phone multiple times.

In the first six-weeks of delivery, the service received 218 referrals and supported 211 victims. 100% of victims were contacted within the agreed timescales, with 54% supported with a successful outcome during the first call. The specialist domestic abuse support workers have also facilitated face-to-face discussions with other co-located partners in the Hub to provide a seamless, timely service to victims within agreed response timescales.

Supporting Victims and Witnesses is a key priority in the Commissioner's new Police and Crime Plan, and he has vowed to ensure all victims receive the tailored support they are entitled to, under the Victims' Code, to help them cope and as far as possible need to recover from crime they have experienced. whilst fulfilling his duty to adhere to the Victims' Code.

The service, which is being piloted over the next 12 months, improves the timeliness of support, ensuring the force meets the Victims' Code requirement to refer victims to services within two working days. It also provides more consistency of service provision, streamlining the pathway to support and providing increased service resilience.

FREE TRAINING!!

Non-fatal strangulation (NFS) is used by perpetrators of domestic abuse to control and intimidate their victim. It is an insidious and lethal form of physical violence which recently became a standalone criminal offence in the Domestic Abuse Act 2021. Despite the strong link between NFS and domestic homicide, it can be difficult to evidence due to a lack of visible injury.

It is vital that professionals understand NFS and the risks it poses.

Safe Lives have worked with the <u>Institute for Addressing Strangulation</u> to develop and deliver training for a range of professionals who encounter victims and survivors of NFS. Professionals interacting with victims and survivors must make an accurate and timely risk assessment, so they can get them the right support as quickly as possible.

Safe Lives are currently offering Introductory eLearning and Introductory webinars, after which, you will be able to book onto a One-day advanced course (tailored to your sector).

White Ribbon Ambassador Training Underway in Peterborough

Earlier this month, two groups of male White Ribbon Ambassadors from Peterborough City Council took part in a training session focused on strengthening their ability to challenge sexist and abusive behaviour, and deepening their understanding of what it means to represent the White Ribbon campaign.

Led by Riswan Rahemtulla, the training featured open and honest discussions about the personal and organisational challenges involved in tackling male violence and domestic abuse. Participants also explored practical strategies for creating change.

This training is part of Peterborough City Council's White Ribbon Accreditation and is helping prepare for the upcoming **Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Conference**, which will be held on **20 June 2025** in Peterborough.

Another White Ribbon Ambassador session is scheduled for **White Ribbon Day**, **25 November 2025**.

DASV Shared Lives Project celebrates finalist success

The DASV Shared Lives Project, a collaborative scheme to support survivors of domestic abuse with learning disabilities, reached the finals of the Local Government Chronicle Awards in the Health and Social Care Category. Whilst, sadly, the project didn't win, the judges commented that they liked the focus on accessible, holistic support for a very vulnerable group and praised the project as an innovative scheme with a strong focus on joint working across adult social care and domestic abuse and passionate leadership.

This Pride Month the multiple disadvantage and homelessness project at Standing Together Against Domestic Abuse is focusing on the lives and experiences of LGBTQ+ people experiencing domestic abuse, . Because the statistics are stark:

- 1 in 4 LGBTQ+ people experience domestic abuse in their lifetime
- LGBTQ+ people are TWICE as likely to become homeless
- Trans people, particularly trans women of colour, face the highest rates of violence and the least access to safe housing and specialist services.

ONS Publishes Updated Domestic Abuse Statistics

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) has published new prevalence data using improved questions that better reflect the full spectrum of domestic abuse, including coercive control and psychological harm.

It shows that **8% of adults aged 16 and over**—around **3.9 million people**—experienced domestic abuse in the last 12 months. This includes **9.5% of women** and **6.5% of men**. These figures are not directly comparable to previous years due to the updated methodology, but they offer a more accurate picture of the scale of harm. So it's not an increase, just wider inclusion criteria which is a better reflection of the real prevalence.

Cervical Screening Awareness Week runs from 19-26th June this year and Healthwatch Essex have made a brilliant short film highlighting how the process can impact survivors of abuse and how healthcare professionals can help to make the procedure less traumatic.

Including tips such as not being dismissive of concerns, not rushing and explaining the equipment used, the film was initiated by a trauma ambassador and includes advice from a nurse on improvements that healthcare colleagues can make.

Support for DASV Survivors in the Armed Forces – new report

Aurora New Dawn have just released a new report - Invisible Battles - Strengthening Advocacy and Support for the Armed Forces Community Affected by Domestic Abuse, Sexual Violence, and Stalking.

Rooted in Aurora's deep experience working with armed forces personnel, this report sheds light on the often-overlooked experiences of victims and survivors within the armed forces community. It explores the barriers they face when seeking help and the urgent need for specialist services that truly understand and meet their unique needs.

Drawing on insights from survivors, frontline professionals, and specialist advocates, Invisible Battles outlines seven key principles – essential foundations for any frontline service supporting armed forces personnel and their families.

Raising awareness of the White Ribbon Campaign - Cambridge City Council

A Cambridge City Council public safety stall was held at the Abbey People's Big Lunch on Sunday 8 June. It was a well organised outdoor community event with a friendly atmosphere bringing together residents for a range of intergenerational activities. A variety of city council teams attended to speak to people about the wide range of activities and services available to Abbey residents, these included in the areas of Sports and Recreation, Community Development, Streets and Open Spaces, and regeneration projects with Housing Development. The public safety stall raised awareness about the White Ribbon campaign which aims to engage men in ending all forms of violence against women and girls. There was much support for the stall, including by the new Leader of Cambridge City Council, Councillor Cameron Holloway, and the new Deputy Mayor, Councillor Richard Swift. The council has its own official White Ribbon accreditation since 2015 for work to help further the campaign's aims, and individuals can also make a pledge to support it.

The Leader of Cambridge City Council, Councillor Cameron Holloway said: 'It was great to see a whole range of City Council teams out spending time with residents at the Big Lunch. I was particularly glad to see the support for the public safety team and their work on the White Ribbon Campaign. At Cambridge City Council, we are committed to making sure everyone in our city feels safe, and much of that work starts with supporting women and girls in the face of male violence and misogyny. We need action across the whole of society to bring about the necessary change in men's attitudes and behaviours towards women and girls and to stamp out male violence. It's a huge task, but community events like this are a really important part of that work.'

Deputy Mayor, Councillor Richard Swift said: 'I spent the afternoon at the Abbey People Big Lunch on Dudley Road Park: what a great community atmosphere! Cameron Holloway (Leader of the City Council and White Ribbon Ambassador) and I visited the White Ribbon Campaign stand, and spent some time talking with Louise Walker about the important work this organisation does. Misogynistic attitudes and behaviour towards women and girls start early. I fully support the White Ribbon movement which is at the forefront of finding ways to address this problem caused by men.'









