# New Therapeutic Service Launched for Young Survivors of Sexual Violence in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough

Peterborough Rape Crisis Care Group (PRCCG) is delighted to announce the launch of a new Therapeutic Emotional Support Service for young people aged 14 and over across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. This exciting new project has been made possible through additional funding from the Cambridgeshire Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC).

Police and Crime Commissioner Darryl Preston said:

"Throughout my time in office I have created opportunities to listen to the voices of victims and survivors and the specialist staff who support them. I am pleased to be able to fund this pilot service to extend the help available to young survivors and give them the time and space to begin to recover from their experiences."

We are grateful to Mr Preston for working closely with PRCCG CEO Jacqui Campey to bring this initiative to life. The service will run as a pilot project from 1st July 2025 to 31st March 2026. Developed by adapting our existing SENSE model, the new programme offers up to eight fortnightly emotional support sessions. These sessions provide a safe, supportive space where young people can explore the impacts of sexual violence. Working with a specialist caseworker, they will focus on stabilisation, grounding techniques, and building connections with trusted support networks. The aim is to foster recovery, resilience, and renewed hope - reminding each young person that what happened to them was not their fault, and it does not have to define their future. Referrals

- For young people under 18, we are only accepting professional referrals to ensure safeguarding remains our highest priority.
- For adults (18+), we accept both self-referrals and professional referrals.

#### Refuge

**Intimate Image Abuse** (IIA) has represented an insidious form of abuse for many years, but advances in technology are producing new iterations of tech-facilitated abuse. IIA refers to the sharing or threats to share sexually intimate images or videos of another person without the person's consent, often with the aim of causing them distress or harm. Sharing of intimate images represents a criminal offence under section 33 of the Criminal Justice and Courts Act 2015.

Following Refuge's successful Naked Threat Campaign, launched in 2020, the Domestic Abuse Act 2021 also made it a criminal offence to threaten to share an intimate image. As caseloads across specialist services continue to grow in response to IIA, notable underreporting persists, so the true scale remains unknown (Mortimer, Phippen, and Wright, 2025) Advancements in Al-generated imagery also mean that deepfakes constitute a newer threat to those experiencing tech-facilitated abuse. A deepfake is a video or image of a person in which their face or body has been digitally altered so that they appear to be someone else. Typically, a lot of the discourse around this issue has been focused on the threat to democracy due to the spread of misinformation. However, a 2023 Report by Security Hero found that sexual content makes up 98% of all deepfake videos online, whilst 99% of the individuals targeted in these are women. These statistics demonstrate how vital it is for domestic abuse support services to lend our voices to this debate, as the prevalence of deepfake abuse with the context of domestic abuse is expected to proliferate further in the coming years unless we take significant action. It is also evident that often marginalised communities and individuals can be more vulnerable to the harm of IIA. For instance, research by Glitch (2024) and other organisations starkly illustrates that Black women are disproportionately harmed by online abuse at large, whilst LGBTIQ+ survivors of intimate image abuse can experience increased risks due to the threats of 'outing' posed by intimate image abuse. That is why within our team we advocate for a more expansive definition of what constitutes an 'intimate' image, which factors in a survivor's individual identity and experiences. For example, were an image of a women without her hijab to be posted online, this may not traditionally be considered an 'intimate' image, but could very much represent one for that individual, and could lead to an increased risk of harm.

The negative impacts of IIA cannot be underestimated, and can lead to severe emotional distress, economic exploitation, and even self-harm and suicide. Survivors within our service often report feeling isolated, distressed and crippled by fear when they have been subjected to IIA. The rise in 'sextortion' also demonstrates this impact and is often targeted against children and young people. **Sextortion is the shortened term for financially motivated sexual extortion**, often based upon an abuser possessing intimate images of a victim. Just one of the tragic cases which illustrates this, <u>Murray Dowey</u> was a Scottish 16-year-old boy who took his life in December 2023 after he was subjected to sextortion tactics. IIA is an abhorrent form of abuse which we must act now to tackle, so that more victims are not subjected to the wide array of harm that it causes.

So how exactly should we seek to tackle IIA and its impact?

- Encourage a focus on education-based interventions, particularly within school settings.
- Increase awareness of IIA and work to deconstruct all victim-blaming narratives and stigmas which continue to act as barriers to accessing support.• Utilise legal mechanisms and advocate for improved responses to IIA reports by police and other professionals.

- Upskill professionals to respond with sensitivity and specialist insight to IIA.
- Hold social media companies to account when they fail to tackle IIA perpetrated on their platforms.
- **Signpost to specialist services and tools** such as <u>Revenge Porn Helpline</u>, <u>StopNCII.org</u>. and the <u>Internet Watch Foundation's Report Remove tool</u>.
- Apply an intersectional lens to IIA and focus on restorative forms of justice alongside legal mechanisms.
- **Invest in specialist services** this should also encapsulate a focus on vital by-and-for services. Intimate image abuse is a pervasive and harmful issue in our society, and it is only by working together with the above goals in mind that we can work to tackle it.

#### Launch of ARU's new reporting platform for violence and abuse.

The 18th July saw the launch of ARU's new reporting platform, Report and Support.

Going forward, anyone from the ARU community, or external to ARU can now report using this platform.

It provides a confidential way to raise ARU's awareness of an incident either anonymously, or with the reporter's contact details for ongoing support.

It can be used by staff, students and visitors to our campuses. You can report an incident that has happened to you, or happened to someone you know, requesting just to inform ARU, or to request support, or support and formal reporting.

**Tell us what happened** and get a response within 5 working days.

**Tell us anonymously.** While we may not be able to take direct action or respond to you individually, the information you share helps us identify and address broader trends. If you'd like to have a two-way conversation while staying anonymous, there's a unique messaging feature that allows us to communicate with you directly.

Reports are confidential and only passed onto relevant staff on a strictly need-to-know basis. This is all part of ARU's wider strategy to address harassment, sexual misconduct, and other forms of abuse at ARU, and provide important support to those affected. 
#### **Art Against Abuse**

#### 2022 Femicide Census Key Findings:

On 2<sup>nd</sup> September 2025 the 14<sup>th</sup> Femicide Census was released. This reports data on women killed by men in the UK in 2022.

Despite years of government interventions to address men's violence against women, girls and children the rate of femicide remains remarkably consistent

- 122 women killed by men
- 51% were killed by a current / former partner
- 40% of women killed by a current / former partner had left or were planning to leave
- More women were killed by their own son than by a stranger
- The vast majority of women were killed in their own home
- Evidence of gratuitous violence (unnecessary, excessive, lack of purpose, harmful/upsetting) was found in just over 2/3 of killings
- 71 of the men were known to have histories of violence against women and/or were subject to monitoring or restrictions by a statutory agency at the time they killed
- 84% of all men who killed, 97% of those charged, were charged with murder, double or multiple murder
- In 17% of killings men used the brute force of their bodied by kicking, hitting and stamping a woman to death

#### **Shared Lives Domestic Abuse & Sexual Violence Project**

The Cambridgeshire Shared Lives Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence (DASV) Project has had a fantastic second year and has just published their 'Year Two Interim Progress Report'. The report highlights a 267% increase in the number of people supported compared to year one. Survivors with learning disabilities and/or autism have been able to access safe, caring environments through Shared Lives Domestic Abuse carers and the Cambridgeshire Outreach service. Giving survivors the chance to feel secure, build confidence, and take positive steps towards the future. Highlights from the second-year report include powerful personal stories, like Ben's journey, where support from his carer has enabled him to grow in independence, reconnect with his community, and start planning for a safe and fulfilling new chapter in life.

This progress has only been possible thanks to the dedication of Shared Lives Domestic Abuse carers and the strong partnerships developed across Cambridgeshire. With ten carers now trained and approved, and over 400 professionals reached through specialist training in the past year, the project is making a real difference both to individuals and to wider professional practice. #### SafeLives welcomes £53 million boost for Drive Project

The **Drive Partnership** receives a four-year investment from the Home Office to expand the Drive Project across England and Wales, addressing the behaviour of high-risk domestic abuse perpetrators.

Victim-survivors tell us that they want and need better responses to the people causing harm in their lives. They need them to be visible, held accountable, and stopped. We are proud to be part of The Drive Partnership - working to end domestic abuse and protect victims by disrupting, challenging, and changing the behaviour of those who are causing harm. The Drive Project combines intensive perpetrator intervention with dedicated support for victims and survivors.

At SafeLives, we've long called for a Whole Picture approach, where prevention, risk reduction, and recovery go hand in hand. Addressing the root causes of abuse is essential if we're serious about ending it. The Drive Project's impact in reducing abuse shows what's possible when agencies act together with clarity and purpose
