One year has led quickly into another and we are already heading towards the end of January – how did that happen?!

We have been covering issues around benefits, housing and people with no recourse to public funds at our DASV Champions meetings in January and have had some great support from colleagues in the County Council's Welfare Benefits Advice Team as well as from partners including Domestic Abuse Housing Accreditation and the Trailblazers. So thank you to everyone who has come along to the sessions.

As we write this introduction, the Government has released its draft Domestic Abuse Bill which has been drawn up following a consultation process in 2018. We are hopeful that the new legislation proposed in the Bill is passed and that we see a really positive change in domestic abuse support across a range of agencies in the future. International Women's Day Lecture by Jessica Eaton

To mark International Women's Day 2019 in Cambridge you are invited to a lecture by Jessica Eaton entitled 'Victim Focus'.

Jessica Eaton is an author, speaker and specialist researcher in the psychology of victim blaming of women subjected to sexual violence. Her PhD was recently submitted and focussed on the reasons why we are so likely to blame women for sexual violence perpetrated against them, why women blame themselves for sexual violence and how professionals understand self-blame after sexual violence. Jessica is also a national specialist course writer, trainer and speaker on the topic of Child Sexual Exploitation and Modern Slavery.

The event is being organised by Anglia Ruskin University and Cambridge City Council, and hosted by Anglia Ruskin University. It will be chaired by Norah Al-Ani, an Honorary Fellow of ARU, Director of Cambridge Rape Crisis and member of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Women's Consortium.

Break4Change Holding Programme starts in February

YMCA Trinity will be delivering another Break4Change Holding Intervention will be running in **Huntingdon in February 2019**.

Below are some of the characteristics of child/adolescent to parent violence to help recognise some of the signs:

A young person (11 – 17yrs) could be:

- Controlling in the home environment where parents are having to modify their own behaviour through fear of consequences
- Being violent or aggressive towards the parent/carer, using weapons
- Deutting the parent or carer down/name calling
- □ Missing from home as a use of control/not attending school
- □ Making threats/unreasonable demands with consequences
- □ Hurting siblings either physically or emotionally
- □ Demanding/stealing money
- Any behaviour used by a young person to control, dominate or coerce parents/carers.
 It is intended to threaten and intimidate and puts family safety at risk

We have some families where there is violence at a high level, some low and some where there is no physical violence however there is a high level of coercive control. Some young people have diagnosis for ADHD, ASD, ODD, however we can still work with them as long as they are able to comprehend choice.

The next 6 week programme will start on **Thursday 28th February** between the hours of **6pm – 8pm.** This programme is for all families across the whole of Cambridgeshire to join. Young people and parents/carers groups work in parallel, however in separate rooms.

Once referrals have been submitted, we will make home visits and carry out assessments where professionals will be kept in the loop. For a referral form please contact clare.taylor@ymcatrinity.org.uk

Management of sex offenders report

HM Inspectorate of Probation and HM Inspectorate of Prisons released a thematic report into Management and Supervision of men convicted of Sexual offences on 24th January. The report found that work in prison with men convicted of sexual offences was poor overall, and raised concerns that the risk to the public from those released was not being managed sufficiently well. The Inspectorate also found that too many assessment tools are in use to be able to risk assess offenders adequately and underuse of accredited community programmes.

The report makes a number of recommendations to National Probation Service and the Prison Service including:

- regular and comprehensive national analyses of offending-related risks and needs of those convicted of sexual offences
- closer working between CRCs, prison staff and the NPS for effective public protection
- improving the integration of assessment tools and the quality of assessments and plans to ensure that the public, particularly children and actual and potential victims, are protected.
- all prisons have an active strategy to reduce reoffending, based on a current needs analysis, that sets out the steps to be taken with the population of convicted sexual offenders.

Cambridge Women's Aid vacancies

We are currently recruiting for two roles:

Part time Project Coordinator to support the delivery of the Ask Me scheme within Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. The post holder will be responsible for recruiting, training and supporting community members to join us in improving local peoples understanding and response to domestic abuse.

This post is fixed term for a minimum of one year. It is mainly based in Cambridge city with some travel throughout Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. Salary is paid at NJC pay scale point 28 which will equate to £20,646 p.a. plus 5% pension contribution for a 30 hour week. Some weekend and evening work will make up part of the normal working week.

Full time Outreach Support Worker wanted to provide practical and emotional support to women affected by domestic abuse.

You will understand the dynamics and impact of domestic violence/abuse and how best to support survivors. Knowledge of help available to survivors of abuse is needed plus the ability to develop supportive relationships with women whilst maintaining professional boundaries.

This post is fixed term for a minimum of one year. It is based in Cambridge City with some travel across the county and is paid at NJC pay scale 26-30, £23,866 - £27,358 p.a for a 37 hour week plus a 5% pension contribution.

WALK WITH US?

The Ferry Project is organising a walk of support for victims of domestic violence on Saturday 6 April 2019. We are asking businesses and Individuals to get involved. We will be raising funds to provide emergency support where needed. Last year in the UK, two million people were victims of domestic violence. Two women a week are killed as a result of domestic abuse. We want to change this. We want to make a clear statement across Fenland that domestic violence is wrong. We want to provide those who have suffered domestic abuse with stability, security and financial help, to give them the courage to walk out of their situation.

For the 'Walk a mile in their shoes' event, we are asking that men walk a mile wearing a pair of healed women's shoes and women walk wearing a full trouser suit, tie and flat shoes. This is a light-hearted way of approaching a serious issue, generating conversations and raising money.

The Ferry Project supports, on average, ten people a year who are homeless as a direct result of domestic violence.
